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GENERAL INFORMATION

TESTING

Students must have a valid photo ID to be able to take the test at the end of their course. If you do not have a valid photo ID, your test will have to be rescheduled.

ENROLLMENT

Every effort will be made to accommodate maximum participation in the course(s) of your choice.

All attendees are encouraged to preregister to ensure available courses. Attendance is mandatory for all courses that begin on Thursday and Friday or you will not be allowed in courses on Saturday. Courses will be subject to cancellation due to low preregistration numbers, so please register as soon as possible!

Students should attend registration to sign in and there they will be given their class assignments. Registration will be located in the CEIC with signage directing them to the appropriate location.

FEE SCHEDULE

All students attending RCC's Fire & Rescue Week MUST pay a \$30 registration fee. The registration fee may be paid by check or money order made out to Randolph Community College.

All IN-STATE students who are affiliated with a Public Safety provider are fee exempt from tuition (but not the \$30 registration fee). All OUT-OF-STATE students or NON-PUBLIC SAFETY affiliated students are required to pay associated tuition fee (\$70), as indicated in the Course Information Section as well.

DRIVER/OPERATOR

Emergency Vehicle Driver (24 Hours)

Friday and Saturday 9 a.m. - 6 p.m., and

Sunday 9 a.m. - 4 p.m.

This course deals with the safe operation of emergency vehicles, driving skills, legal implications of emergency driving, and departmental standard operating procedures.

SPECIALTY COURSES

Advanced Extrication

Saturday and Sunday 8 a.m. - 5 p.m.

This class will cover vehicle stabilization and advanced extrication techniques. Students will learn how to stabilize vehicles and extricate victims from the most challenging situations such as rollovers, under rides, vehicles on their sides, and multiple vehicle collisions with multiple extrications. This class will be mostly scenario based, with a limited amount of classroom time. Students need to have at least a basic knowledge of all power and hand tool extrication equipment. This class is perfect for the student who has a basic knowledge of extrication and is ready to move up to the next level of training.

Company Officer (17 Hours)

Friday 6 p.m. – 9 p.m. Saturday 8 a.m. – 5 p.m.

Sunday 8 a.m. − 3 p.m.

This course will be real life, high energy sessions.

Friday – "Why Are We Here?" – This session takes the Company Officer or aspiring Company Officer through the journey of "Why Are We Here". As in, why are we as Company Officers sitting in a class of peers for a weekend school. This is a student/instructor engaging session to cover topics of today's Company Officer Role.

Saturday – Modern Fire Service Leadership – This session will Present methods to adjust to leading in the modern fire service. Culture, society, and technology have all changed the way the Fire service must lead. This course will utilize real world Experience and mistakes to present effective methods to move our service forward. This class will allow for students to gain a better understanding of the methods needed to lead modern fire departments into the future.

Sunday – Company Officer Training Day – This session will present scenario based group activities for attendees to think on their own and problem solve along with presenting to their peers. Scenarios will incorporate Tactics, Administration, and Company Officer specific tasks. Participation is expected and will Require getting "outside the box" on some scenarios.

Fire Chief 101 2020 Ed (8 Hours)

Saturday 8 a.m. - 5 p.m.

This certification-related course is designed to apprise chief Officers of the various aspects and complexities surrounding the operations and organization of North Carolina fire departments. Emphasis will be placed on ratings and inspections, NFIRS reporting, prevention and relief funds, grant programs, basic line of duty death information, various state associations, and an overview of chief officer expectations in North Carolina. This class will satisfy the 9S insurance inspection criteria as specified by the North Carolina Administrative Code. This course should be offered consistent with the most current N.C. Fire and Rescue Commission guidelines; contact the Office of State Fire Marshal (OSFM) for details.

Fire Chief 101 Update (4 Hours)

Saturday 8 a.m. - 12 p.m.

This certification-related course is designed as an update to the Fire Chief 101 Course. Course content is revised on a five-year cycle so that chief officers receive the most relevant and current information available. This course should be offered consistent with the most current N.C. Fire and Rescue Commission guidelines; contact the Office of State Fire Marshal (OSFM) for details.

HazMat Ops (36 Hours)

Tuesday-Friday 6 p.m. - 10 p.m.

Saturday and Sunday 8 a.m. - 7 p.m.

This course is designed to cover initial response objectives to a hazardous materials incident. This block will present the candidate with the knowledge, skills, and ability to satisfy the requirements of OSHA 1910.120 and Chapter 4, 5, 6.2, and 6.6 of NFPA 1072: Standard for Hazardous Materials/Weapons of Mass Destruction Emergency Response Personnel Professional Qualifications (2017 edition). This course should be offered consistent with the most current NC Fire and Rescue Commission guidelines; contact the Office of State Fire Marshal (OSFM) for details. Effective date July 1, 2020/NFPA 1072 Standard, 2017 edition.

ICS 300 (21 Hours)

Wednesday and Thursday 8 a.m. - 5 p.m.

Friday 8 a.m. – 1 p.m.

This course provides greater description and details of the Incident Command System (ICS) organization and operations, including application of essential principles and description of air operations. There are five modules: Organizations and Staffing, Organizing for Incidents and Events, Resources Management, Air Operations and Incident and Event Planning. This course includes a final exam. Prerequisites: ICS-100, ICS-200, and ICS-700. This course must follow all current Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) guidelines.

ICS 400 (15 Hours)

Saturday 8 a.m. – 5 p.m. and Sunday 8 a.m. – 4 p.m.

This course emphasizes large-scale organization development, roles and relationships of the primary staff, the planning, operational, logistical and fiscal consideration related to a large and complex, incident and event management. It describes the application of Area Command and the importance of interagency coordination during complex incidents and events. This course includes a final exam. Prerequisites: ICS-100, ICS-200, and ICS-300. This course must follow all current Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) guidelines. Instructor: Matt Hunt and Steven Gross

Instructor I (26 Hours)

Thursday 1 p.m. – 6 p.m. Friday and Saturday 8 a.m. – 6 p.m. Sunday 8 a.m. – 5 p.m.

This course will present the Instructor I candidate with the Knowledge, skills, and ability to satisfy the requirements of NFPA 1041: Standard for Fire and Emergency Services Instructor Professional Qualifications (2019 edition; Chapter 4).

RIC Certification (48 Hours)

Tuesday - Sunday 8 a.m. - 5 p.m.

This course covers Safety and Survival, Mayday, and Rapid Intervention Crew (RIC), the three topics necessary to meet the knowledge, skills, and abilities to satisfy the key requirements of NFPA 1407: Standard for Training Fire Service Rapid Intervention Crews (2020 edition). This series course combines all content from courses FIP-6412 Rapid Intervention Crew (RIC 2020) and FIP-6413 Mayday/Safety & Survival (RIC 2020). This course should be offered consistent with the most current NC Fire and Rescue Commission guidelines; contact the Office of State Fire Marshal (OSFM) for details. Effective date July 1, 2020/NFPA 1407 Standard, 2020 edition.

Street Smart Search: Search Smarter (8 Hours)

Saturday 8 a.m. – 5 p.m.

This course is designed to localize common mistakes in departments of all sizes regarding search tactics and methods, so we can improve our citizens chance of survival. We will perform hands on methods of search, as well as searching in realistic fire conditions. This class is intended for officers, those aspiring to be officers and experienced firefighters, but all certified firefighters are welcome. This will include lecture, group discussion and hands on evolutions.

TECHNICAL RESCUER

TR Horizontal Systems (12 Hours)

Tuesday and Thursday 6 p.m. – 9 p.m. and Saturday 9 a.m. – 4 p.m.

This certification-related course in horizontal systems will present the Technical Rescuer (TR) with the correct techniques for the setup, operation, and functions of horizontal systems for use at a rope rescue incident. This course should be offered consistent with the most current NC Fire and Rescue Commission guidelines. Contact the Office of State Fire Marshall (OSFM) for details.

TR VR Vehicle Rescue Block (40 Hours)

Wednesday-Sunday 8 a.m. - 5 p.m.

This certification-related course in vehicle rescue will present the Technical Rescuer (TR) with the knowledge, skills, and ability to satisfy the requirements of Chapter Ten Vehicle Rescue of NFPA 1006: Standard for Technical Rescue Professional Qualifications. Individual courses included in this block are Rescue Operations for Vehicle Rescue, Vehicle Rescue Vehicle Anatomy and New Technologies, Stabilization and Extrication Techniques, Large Vehicle Rescue and Victim Management. FIP-5710 transfers as one block, in its entirety, to the Office of State Fire Marshal (OSFM). Students must successfully complete all of the individual TR Vehicle Rescue courses that are part of this block to get credit for any of the courses and to be issued certification. This course should be offered consistent with the most current NC and Fire Rescue Commission guidelines. Contact OSFM for details.

Leadership in Supervision Creating Environments for Professional Growth (16 Hours)

Thursday and Friday 8 a.m. - 5 p.m.

This two-day course presents the supervisor with the basic leadership skills and tools needed to perform effectively in the fire and EMS environment. The course includes concepts related to a successful transition to supervisory and leadership roles, including concepts of adaptive leadership; change management; active followership; effective communication, including difficult conversations and advocacy-inquiry based dialogue; ethics; authority; power; decision-making; and active engagement through development of a personal plan.

Leadership in Supervision Perspectives in Thinking (16 Hours)

Saturday and Sunday 8 a.m. - 5 p.m.

This two-day course provides the supervisor with the conceptual foundation and framework for success in leadership roles by exploring creative, analytical, political and critical thinking perspectives. The course addresses skills needed for assessing situations from multiple perspectives, making critical decisions, fostering creativity and innovation, and using persuasion.

Defining the Search and Engine/Truck HOT (18 Hours) *Friday 7 p.m.* – 9 p.m.




Engine – During the Engine practical evolutions portion students will be engaged in flowing and moving charged hose lines. Students will stretch multiple styles of packed lines. Students will also learn the ins and outs of extending lines. Students will learn and review techniques used to effectively move a charged hose line. Students will also perform methods used to create a positive outcome for fire control and IDLH environment cooling through proper nozzle position and water application.

Truck - Defining the Search reinforces the mindset or prioritizing search, dispelling any myths associated with common and uncommon search techniques. Students will experience and gain confidence completing searches in realistic scenarios prepared by TFI cadre from past first-hand experiences. Students will gain experience and confidence while searching with a water can. A victim first mentality will constantly be reinforced by all cadre members, the student will learn best/proven practice of victim management from; drags, removal, and after removal from the structure. The focible entry portion is designed to be very flexible and dynamic based on students' skill level. Regardless, students will leave with a better knowledge of forcible entry and become better at the task. Altogether we will preach the importance of searching behind the door after every forcible entry event. The importance of masking up quickly will also be covered.

If you seek to improve your marketability in the workplace or to enhance your current skill level, the RCC Fire Academy will offer you an opportunity to complete certifications in a timely manner or successfully prepare you for a career in the fire service. You will be provided structure, quality training, and the motivation needed to be successful in attaining your personal and professional emergency services goals.

RCC's Fire Academy is ideal for potential fire service members as well as existing fire service personnel. The Academy hours will be 8 a.m. - 5 p.m., Monday - Friday with physical training included daily. New academies begin each January and August.

Upon graduation, Fire Cadets will receive N.C. Firefighter certification, Hazardous Materials Level 1 Responder certification, Technical Rescuer: General and Vehicle Machinery Rescue certification, orientation to the fire service, exposure to several area fire service agencies, as well as the physical and mental training required to excel in today's fire service.

The Fire Protection Technology program is designed to provide the technical and professional knowledge needed for officer level decision making pertaining to fire protection for private and public sectors. It provides coursework in managerial and leadership areas necessary for promotion for existing firefighters as well as a solid foundation for continuing higher learning in the fire protection community.

Course work includes diverse fire protection subject areas, including fire prevention and safety, public education, building construction, fire ground strategies and tactics, and local government finance and laws, as they apply to emergency services management. Emphasis includes understanding fire characteristics and the structural consequences of fire; risk assessment and management; and relevant research, communications, and leadership methodologies.
